STATEMENT OF BELIEF

Sunnybrook Christian Academy is a ministry of **Temple of Praise Church**. Following is a statement of beliefs.

- 1. We believe in one God, Son and Holy Spirit, Creator of all things.
- 2. We believe that the Lord Jesus Christ, the Son of God, was conceived of the Holy Spirit, born of a Virgin, was crucified, died,

buried, resurrected, and ascended into Heaven and is now seated at the right hand of the Father, and is true God and true man.

- 3. We believe the Bible in its entirety to be the inspired Word of God and the infallible rule of faith and conduct. (2 Tim.3:15-17).
- 4. We believe in the resurrection of the dead, the eternal happiness of the saved, and the eternal punishment of the (unsaved) lost.
- 5. We believe in personal salvation of believers through the shed blood of Jesus Christ.
- 6. We believe the Biblical concept of marriage and sexual orientation.
- 7. We believe in sanctification through the Word of God, by the Holy Spirit in the personal holiness of heart and life.
- 8. We believe in divine healing, through faith in the Name of Jesus, and that healing is included in the Atonement.
- 9. We believe in water baptism, in the baptism of the Holy Spirit as distinct from the new birth, in speaking with tongues as the Spirit of God gives utterance (Acts 2:4), in the gifts of the Spirit, and the evidence of the fruits of the Spirit. We believe that all are available to believers.
- 10. We believe in the Christian hope, the soon coming, and personal return of the Lord Jesus Christ. We believe in evangelizing and missionary work in accordance with the Christian commission in Matthew 28:19.

The need for spiritual growth in the light of these principles has led Sunnybrook to adopt standards that are believed to best promote the environment and the spiritual welfare of the student. The school requests that students in grades 5th-12th sign the following pledge.

Throughout my enrollment as a student in Sunnybrook I pledge to:

- Obey those that have authority over me for this is right in the sight of God.
- Accept all school policies, rules, and procedures with a proper attitude because discontentment can become a costly habit that can rob me of the pleasure of being a positive student.
- Be responsible do my own work, and to behave in a way that will not disrupt the teaching-learning process.
- Maintain a kind, courteous, and respectful attitude toward fellow students and teachers.
- Maintain Christian standards in honesty (not lie, cheat, or steal), stewardship, and morality.
- Refrain at all times from the use of profanity, offensive slang, and vulgarity in word or action.
- Abstain from smoking, drinking alcoholic beverages, the abuse of drugs, gambling, involvement in inappropriate music, and/or behavior.

I am expected to not only keep this pledge and abide by its standards whether at **home**, at **school**, or **elsewhere** (Acts 9:15), but also to encourage my peers in following it. This will require courage, consistency, diligence, and a genuine enthusiastic effort.

Failure to follow this standard of conduct will be cause for discipline and/or suspension. If I am found to be out of harmony or in breach of conduct with Sunnybrook's ideals of work and behavior, I understand that I may be invited to withdraw. Ephesians 5:3 says in part "...immorality, all impurity, or covetousness, let it not be once named among you..."

PARENT – TEACHER CONFERENCES

During the school year two (2) separate parent teacher conferences are mandatory. One is at the beginning of the year for Open House and one at the end of the first semester in January. A parent may request a conference with

a teacher during the school year by writing the teacher a note or calling the school office and making the proper arrangements. If a conference with the Principal is desired, the same procedure should be followed. Please do not attempt to see a teacher, principal, or administrator without an appointment.

VISITORS

It is the desire of the administration and faculty to be of service to both parent and student. A visit from any parent is welcome; however, it must be made by appointment to avoid interruption of the teaching-learning process.

We are unable to accommodate visitors during lunch. Our lunch serving times must remain on schedule. Lunch with your child for a special occasion must be pre-arranged.

All visitors, including field trip chaperones, must sign in through the office.

Students are not allowed to have friends visit during school hours.

FINANCIAL

A non-refundable Registration and Evaluation Fee is due and payable upon the submission of student(s) application(s).

A separate book fee, including other fees, is due by August 3rd. Parents purchase certain books and pay a usage fee(s) on others. The Statement of Cooperation lists the amounts for the current school year.

Sunnybrook Christian Academy operates on a 10-month financial plan given to us by our Heavenly Father. We agree together on the fulfillment of Philippians 4:19. Monthly tuition is to be tendered on the first (1st) of each month. Please be prompt in paying as a \$35.00 late fee is assessed if paid after the 3rd of the month. There is a \$35.00 charge should a check be returned.

If a student is withdrawn, parents are responsible for the full monthly tuition. No records (report cards, transcripts, etc.) can be released if there is a balance on an account.

NON-DISCRIMINATORY POLICY

In the spirit of Christian unity and the love that Christ shows for all mankind, Sunnybrook Christian Academy admits students of any race, national, and ethnic origin to all the rights, privileges, programs, and activities generally accorded or made available to students in the school. SCA does not discriminate in the administration of educational policies, scholarships, or any other school administered programs.

Sunnybrook does, however, reserve the right to use appropriate selection criteria in fulfillment of its stated Christian goals and objectives.

As God supplies, the local body and the administration have the responsibility to provide the facilities and personnel for young people to grow spiritually into the whole person.

The Authority for such education comes from God's command that children be taught to love God and place Him first in their lives, and the fact that parents are responsible for the total education and training of their children.

Upon the parents' request, the Christian school will seek to aid the parents in fulfilling their God-given responsibility of training their children in the way of Godly living. The student must be taught the Scripture as the basis for all knowledge and wisdom as it will permeate every academic endeavor.

We further believe that the school is a special service to the children of parents who share our concern for each person's relationship with God.

We believe that our curriculum meets the requirements of college preparation and more importantly, exemplifies Biblical standards.

STANDARD OF CONDUCT

Sunnybrook Christian Academy holds that the Bible is the infallible, divine Word of God and that salvation by faith in Christ is the initial step in the Christian life. There is adequate Biblical basis for the idea of spiritual growth into the image of Christ (Romans 8:29), which is the work of the Holy Spirit (2 Corinthians 3:18). This growth begins with the initial act of saving faith and continues throughout life. The Holy Spirit makes the Christian aware of the biblical demands for a holy life which fulfills both God's moral law and high law of love (Matthew 22:37-39; Romans 13:8-10; Galatians 5:14). The result is a life consecrated unto God and separated from the world.

Sunnybrook endeavors to provide an environment conducive to the spiritual development of young people who are not yet mature Christians. A standard of conduct based on the activities of the Christian must be subordinate to the glory of God who indwells us (I Corinthians 8: 9, 12, 13; 10:32).

A Christian endeavors to avoid practices which cause the loss of sensitivity to the spiritual needs of others or loss of the Christian's physical, mental, or spiritual well-being (I Corinthians 9:27).

3-EXTRA CURRICULAR PARTICIPATION GUIDELINES (6th – 12th grade)

All students will maintain a 75 "C" or better in each class. If a student has a 74 "D" or lower, he/she will be allowed to miss practice in order to attend

required tutoring. . Any discipline infractions will deem the student ineligible to participate until cleared by SCA Administration.

All students must adhere to the NO PASS NO PARTICIPATE

GUIDELINES until they have met all academic, discipline and attendance requirements to remain eligible

NO PASS NO PARTICIPATE GUIDELINES

- End of day Thursday Failing list submitted to Principal
- Every Friday Grade checks from Principal and Failing List reported
- Failing students have 5 days (Saturday Wednesday) to bring their grade to passing for each Failing Report given.
 - o 1st Failing Report Notice is sent to parent. Student is *required* to attend tutoring but will still be able to practice and participate in extracurricular activity during the 1st report. Student Athlete will have 5 days to bring themselves to passing. (Saturday-Wednesday)
 - Extra Curricular Activity is defined as any SCA approved activity that a current SCA student participates in such as Performing Arts competition, Fieldtrips etc....
- If passing after 1st Failing Report, it is the students responsibility to get a Participation Clearance Note signed off from the teacher(s) and and submit form to the Principal in order to return to eligible status.
- If not passing after the 1st Failing Report; Student will be required to attend afterschool tutoring. Student will not be able to participate in extra curricular activities and will remain in probation until he/she can satisfactorily meet the academic standards to remain eligible.
- There is zero tolerance for any discipline infractions. Students must maintain a level of excellence

-6-HOURS

Elementary & Secondary will report to their designated area upon arrival on campus. Students will be accepted on campus no earlier than 7:30 am

It is necessary to pick up your child(ren) on time to avoid the assessment of late pickup fees and the inconvenience.

ATTENDANCE – ABSENCES – TARDIES

Regular attendance is absolutely essential to be successful at school. Absences are classified as either excused or unexcused. Excused absences include sickness, death in the immediate family, doctor's appointment, or other circumstances approved in advance.

An unexcused absence is given for any other reason, wherein:

- 1. A zero is given in every subject missed.
- 2. Missed tests must be taken and grade averaged with a zero.

Upon a student's return to school, a note written by the parent or guardian explaining the reason for the absence must be given to the elementary or to the attendance office (6th -12th). A doctor's excuse is required for absences of three or more consecutive days. **Students are responsible for all missed work.**

The Compulsory Attendance Law for the State of Texas requires that a student not miss more than 10% of the total school days, which is 18 absences, excused or unexcused. The student may be sent home and required to repeat the grade or attend summer school. Fees apply and truancy fines may be assessed.

Secondary (6th -12th) **Tardiness to school** – with few exceptions, is inexcusable. Students who are tardy to class will be subject to disciplinary action which will include lunch and/or afterschool detention on the same day. Students who are more than fifteen minutes late to school/class are considered absent, and must report to the administrative office to receive an admit. Students who drive to school and are consistently tardy are subject to losing their campus parking and/or off campus lunch privileges until on-time attendance becomes consistent. Three tardies will result in an absence. If a student is more than 20 minutes late for a class, it is considered an absence.

Students in athletics and extra curricular programs arriving after 11:30am with an unexcused absence will not be permitted to participate the day of scheduled competition or extra curricular activity.

Note: Students driving to school must submit copy of valid driver license and current insurance in order to park on campus. Students who leave school without office approval and signing out are considered truant and parking privilege will be revoked.

-11-ILLNESS – MEDICINE For the welfare of your child and others in the school, all children who are sick must be kept home. If medication is to be given at school, clear and precise written instruction must be given to the teacher *and* school office. No medication is to be in a student's possession. A school official will dispense all medication. This includes **ALL** over the counter analgesic pain relievers.

DROP OFF/PICK-UP PROCEDURES

These procedures are for the protection and safety of everyone. Your cooperation is of utmost importance and is greatly appreciated.

- 1. **Right lane** is for pick-up and drop off only. If your child is not available for immediate pick up, please drive around or park in a parking space until your child is released.
- **2. Left lane** is for <u>drive through only</u>. Students will not be dismissed to cars in the drive through lane as this places them in jeopardy walking in front of the pick-up lane.
- **3. Speed Limit** must be observed. Entrance speed may vary up to 15 miles per hour. Upon entering the parking area, do not exceed 10 mph. Please slow down and watch for pedestrians.
- **4. Late Pick-up** (elementary) is after 3:30 pm. It is required an elementary student is enrolled in TOP ECDC After School Care Program or a late pick-up fee is assessed. No student may be left unattended. *They are not to wait or loiter around the grounds*.
- **5.** Late Pick-up (secondary) is after 3:45. Students remaining will report to an assigned room and late pick-up fee is assessed. No student may be left unattended. *They are not to wait or loiter around the grounds*.

NOTE: If you need to speak with your child's teacher, please schedule an appointment to meet with the teacher in the classroom. Elementary students are dismissed at 3:15, but teachers are on duty until 3:30 and must attend to all the students in their class.

Secondary students are dismissed at 3:35. If you have a child in both elementary and secondary, please allow for the delay by parking in a parking space. Please do not block cars in a parking space.

Student Athletes should be picked up promptly after practice or games on campus. No student is to remain on campus before a game/activity. Coaches/Directors are only responsible for the student(s) participating in games/activities.

DISCIPLINE

Discipline is scriptural and will be enforced at Sunnybrook. We believe God's Word clearly shows that you cannot train a child unless there is discipline. Biblical discipline is a spiritual blend of love and control. These two factors must balance as we train the whole child – spirit, soul, and body. Discipline is something that you do for a child and not to a child and should contain positive reinforcement as well as negative. With this in mind, following is a description of our method of discipline so that we can fulfill Proverbs 22:6: "Train up a child in the way he should go, and when he is old he will not depart from it." If an infraction of a rule or guideline occurs, several steps will take place. The various steps consist of non-participation in certain activities, lunch detention, after school detention, swats, in-school suspension, home suspension, and eventually expulsion. The teacher involved in the matter will discuss the infraction with the child to see if a direct challenge of the rule took place or a simple childish mistake occurred. Both must be corrected but in a different manner. Once this has been determined, the appropriate action will take place. Consequence of any discipline infraction will be determined by the school Principal, Administrator, and/or SCA School Board.

The Bible says that "foolishness" is bound in the heart of a child. All students are expected to follow the rules and be respectful. In the event the violation is determined to be flagrant and "paddling" is deemed necessary, the parents will be notified and given the option of coming to the school to personally administer swats or give permission for authorized personnel of Sunnybrook to do so as follows:

- 1) The child is taken to the school office.
- 2) Authorized personnel will administer swats.
- 3) Prayer for forgiveness and strength to correct the behavior occurs.
- 4) Positive reassurance will then be given to the child.

Correction must be prompt, and if parents fail to respond when notified, the child may be withheld from class and receive a "0" for missed work or tests.

Electronic Devices: Electronic devices that have access to internet such as cellphones, cellular watches, tablets, lap taps etc,.may not be used during school hours without permission. Electronic devices should be left in the office. Any electronic device used during school hours without permission will be confiscated. The parent may claim it from the office. Any calls must be made with permission from the school office.

DRESS CODE AND UNIFORM

SCA provides a high quality education, academically as well as spiritually. It is our conviction that the physical appearance of our students is an essential element in the education of the total child. Proper grooming must be taught along with the other rules concerning manners and morals. We insist upon Christian **modesty** and **neatness** in dress and general appearance. Administrative discretion applies in all dress code matters.

It is important that parents recognize their obligation to the school and to the child to have each child in full and proper uniform every day school is in session.Parent will be called immediately to bring the dress code item necessary for compliance . A student in violation will not be allowed in class or school event after two (2) written warnings until they are dress code compliant.

<u>BOYS</u>: Required: Khaki uniform pant with black belt and white oxford shirt with plaid, blue or navy blue tie *must be worn on chapel days*. It is required that ALL shirts must be neatly tucked in with a black belt pant or short.

Optional: Khaki walking shorts and SCA knit polo w/logo ($1^{st} - 8^{th}$ Royal Blue) & ($9^{th} - 12^{th}$ Red) may be worn on non-chapel days.

Shoes: Black oxford shoe with white or black above the ankle socks.

Hair: Must be neatly groomed. No extreme haircuts, styles, or hair lengths; no tint or highlights. Secondary boys must be clean-shaven and sideburns must not exceed the earlobe.

Jewelry: Limited to a watch and one ring per hand (6th – 12th only) No earrings, body piercing, or tattoos.

GIRLS:

1st_8th Required: Uniform skirt, mid-knee or longer in length and a white *middy* blouse w/logo with plaid tie. 1st & 5th No nail polish or make up allowed. Jewelry is limited to one set of stud earrings on ear lobe. 6th - 8th No nail polish or make up allowed. Jewelry is limited to one ring per hand and one set of small stud earrings on ear lobe. Optional: skort and white or navy blue jersey polo w/logo may be worn on non-chapel days

9th–12th Required: Uniform skirt, mid-knee or longer in length, and a *white* banded blouse w/logo with plaid tie. Optional: white or navy blue jersey polo w/logo may be worn on non-chapel days.

Cold weather days $1^{st} - 12^{th}$ Optional: Navy uniform pant can be worn on cold weather days and worn on *non-chapel days* during the 2^{nd} and 3^{rd} quarters only.

Shoes: $1^{st} - 5^{th}$ - Uniform black maryjane or white saddle oxford; 6^{th} - 12^{th} uniform black penny loafer with solid white, grey, or navy blue socks above the ankle.

Make-up: $(9^{th}-12^{th}$ only) Light make-up, eyeliner only natural tones and light or neutral nail polish. No writing, marking, or tattooing of skin. Only prescription contacts may be worn.

Jewelry: (9th–12th only) is limited to one ring per hand and one set of matching stud earrings on the ear lobe. No cartilage or body piercing.

Hair: Must be neatly and modestly groomed. No extreme cuts, styles, or hair lengths; no tint or highlights. Hair accessories must be school uniform colors.

GENERAL: No advertising of any kind on clothing, bags, etc.

- NO sports logos, cartoon characters, other school logos on anything.
- NO jackets, coats or hoodies are to be worn in the classroom.
- Jackets and coats are to be a solid and neutral color
- SCA issued shirts or sweaters *may be worn* in the classroom.
- On **non-uniform days or other school events**, no bare midriffs or shoulders, no sleeveless or "see through" blouses are allowed.
- Student athletes or Performing Arts students should wear SCA issued uniforms, t-shirts, sweatshirts to any school participating activity.
- Skirts and dresses must be loose-fitted, mid-knee or longer in length with no extreme slits.
- Pants must be properly fitted (not baggy) and worn above the hip.
- Shoes must be attached to the foot. No slide or flip-flop type shoes.

FIELD TRIPS: Dress code for field trips is as follows:

Elementary – Jersey polo and uniform skirt (girls) or khaki pant (boys)

 $\underline{Secondary} - \ Jersey \ polo \ and \ uniform \ skirt \ (\ girls) \ or \ khaki \ pant \ (boys)$

*Note: Teachers may change the dress code for special events.

Chaperones must present a valid driver's license and proof of insurance before transporting. SCA's General Dress Code applies to parents attending field trips. Modesty and neatness in dress and general appearance is important

PHYSICAL EDUCATION: One PE uniform, t-shirt and shorts, is included in the books and fees. Additional uniforms may be purchased in the office. Court shoes and socks are required for gym class. PE is required for 1st thru 9th grades and can only be exempted by a doctor's written exemption submitted to office.

HOMEWORK

An assignment book (or steno pad) to record homework assignments is required in all grades. A secondary student who does not do an assignment will serve an after school detention the <u>same day</u> of the <u>violation</u>. Students will be required to do the missing assignment as well as that day's assignment for that particular class. There is no prior notice to the parent. To avoid inconvenience, please check that your child's homework is completed each evening and sign the steno.

On Wednesdays and days of special activities at S.C.A., homework assignments should be kept to a minimum (with the exception of unfinished class work that might need to be sent home). Considering the speed at which the child works – the average time for homework should not exceed one and a half-hour of consistent work time. This does not mean that the child will have 1½ hours of work every day, but it does give a frame of expectation of the child's performance within the curriculum. As the grade level increases, so will the workload.

GRADING SCALE

Grading periods occur every nine weeks. Report cards may be issued at Parent–Teacher meetings, sent home with the child, or mailed. Numerical and letter grades are used as shown.

 $80 - 89 = B$ $75 - 79 = C$ $70 - 74 = D$ $0 - 69 = F$

Three (3) week progress reports are sent home in grades $3^{rd} - 5^{th}$. Mid-quarter reports (4 ½ weeks) are sent home in grades $6^{th} - 12^{th}$.

PROMOTION

Student must pass and meet attendance requirements to be promoted or Summer School and/or attendance recovery is required.

Grade 1–3: Math and Language Arts (Spelling, Phonics, & Reading)

Grade 4–6: Math, Grammar, Reading, Spelling, History, and Science

Grade 7–8: Math, English, History, Science, and Bible

High School: NO credit is given for courses failed. The following credits, plus Bible are required for graduation:

4 credits of English 4 credits History 1 credit PE
4 credits of Math 4 credits Science ½ credit Health
2 credits of Spanish 2 credits Electives 2 credits Technology

ATHLETIC PARTICIPATION GUIDELINES

 $(6^{th}-12^{th} grade)$

A Student Athlete will maintain a 75 "C" or better in each class. If a Student Athlete has a 74 "D" or lower, he/she will be allowed to miss practice in order to attend required tutoring. Any discipline infractions will deem the student athlete ineligible to participate or play until cleared by SCA Administration. All Student Athletes must adhere to the NO PASS NO PLAY GUIDELINES until they have met all academic, discipline and attendance requirements to remain eligible.

NO PASS NO PLAY GUIDELINES

- End of day Thursday Failing list submitted to Principal
- Every Friday Grade checks from Principal and Failing List reported
- Failing students have 5 days (Saturday Wednesday) to bring their grade to passing each Failing Report given.
 - 1st Failing Report Notice is sent to parent and head coach. Student Athlete is required to attend tutoring and will still be able to practice and participate in competition during the 1st report. Student Athlete will have 5 days to bring themselves to passing. (Saturday-Wednesday)

- Competition is defined as any SCA team participation in athletic activities such as scrimmages, games, and/or tournaments.
- If passing after 1st Failing Report, it is the student athletes responsibility to get a Participation Clearance Note signed off from the teacher(s) and submit form to Principal in order to return to eligible status.
- If not passing after the 1st Failing Report; Student Athlete will be required to attend afterschool tutoring and will be placed on probation. Student Athlete will not be able to participate in competition but may continue to practice. Student Athlete will remain on probation until he/she can satisfactorily meet the academic standards to remain eligible.
- There is zero tolerance for any discipline infractions. Student Athletes must maintain a level of excellence

Closed Campus Policy

- Sunnbrook is a closed campus and students may not leave for lunch.
- No food dilveries will be allowed.
- Parents may drop off food, or eat with students, after clearing it with the office.
- Students how drive to school on their own, must have a parking pass.
